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3 DRIVERS JAILED FOR CONTRAVENING

The Road Transport and Safety Agency (RTSA) on 27th May, 2024 secured the conviction and jailing of three drivers for the offence of contravening. This was in a case where, the trio, all on different occasions stopped at undesignated places for the purposes of picking and dropping passengers. This conviction came barely a few days after the RTSA CEO and Director Eng. Amon Mweemba held a meeting with Lusaka Public Service Vehicle (PSV) drivers at Nakatindi Hall in Lusaka where he urged bus drivers and bus owners to be compliant on traffic laws.

The conviction was secured by the Agency under the Public Service Vehicle (PSV) Regulation 16 (1) (2) (3) (4) part 111 of Chapter 465 and Section 225 of the Road Traffic Act. The convicted drivers are Gift Mubo, 28, who was charged a K900.00, Peter Miti, 28 who was charged a K1000.00 and Joseph Mwale, 40 who was also slapped with a K900.00 charge. Elated with the development, RTSA Legal Officer, Peter Mulyata assured the public of more convictions as most drivers were non complaint despite the Agency sensitizing them on countless occasions.

UNDP CONFERS WITH MINISTRY OF FINANCE ON ROAD SAFETY IN ZAMBIA

THE United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) says Road Traffic Crashes (RTCs) are costing Zambia 16.7 billion kwacha annually in treating accident victims. Speaking when he paid a courtesy call on Acting Minister of Finance and National Planning Hon. Musaba Tayali, UNDP Country Representative, James Wakaige, thanked the Ministry for supporting their works particularly on the global Decade of Action to reduce road traffic crashes.

Mr. Wakiage encouraged the use of non-motorised transport and the provision of improved road safety measures and infrastructure

He said road construction should take into consideration the provision of pedestrian walk-ways and cycle paths and reduce on car-dominated road space which is a contributory factor of Road Traffic Crashes (RTCs) among pedestrians.


Meanwhile Mr. Tayali thanked UNDP for being a true partner in the promotion of road safety.

The Minister said that there was need for continued stakeholder collaboration between the Government and the UNDP in order to improve the road safety profile of the country.

Mr. emphasised the need for both parties to continue coming up with practical road safety intervention in order to mitigate road traffic crashes.

The Minister said the Government would re-align the transport policy to conform to measures aimed at promoting road safety measures. Mr. Tayali stated that the Investment Case to be launched this month was timely especially after the launch of construction works on the Lusaka-Ndola dual carriageway by President Hakainde Hichilema.
